State of the Regiment

When I assumed command of the 23rd just over a year ago, I made a decision to give it a year before making any changes. I have had input from many of you in the past year as to the manner in which you would like your regiment to move forward in the 21st century.

After having been in command for some time now, I have sought guidance from the officers and past commanders of the 23rd.

I am now prepared to put forward several changes to the Regimental Orders and to move forward with both the implementation of a new Drill Manual in conjunction with a revised and condensed set of ROs which will be given to each member. These will be forth coming in the early part of 2011.

Among the changes and modifications I am considering are:

1. Full adoption and formal inclusion of the "late war" uniform with most of the guidelines and stipulations that most of you are aware of.
2. Possible inclusion of appropriately attired family members attending events under the group insurance policy
3. A revised membership stipulation in which the "non membership" in other units of our time period is codified and enforced.
4. An added clause to the ROs by which membership in the regiment may be revoked, the reasons for revocation of membership and methods by which appeals can be made.
5. A streamlined regimental supply system by which membership dues and equipment costs will be charged to your credit card and you will only be ordering from one person.
6. Guidelines for maintaining "officer" status in the RWFA.

This is Ken's baby and I for one, can't wait!!

The BAR Invitational event scheduled for the 300th anniversary of Needham, Massachusetts on May. 21-22 isn't a national event, nor a British Brigade event per se, but it will be a large regional one involving all Crown Forces units that are part of the Boston Garrison, and all American units that do Battle Road, plus many other units. Your unit is invited to participate at an event to be held at Ridgehill Reservation, in Needham, Massachusetts, on Saturday and Sunday May 21st and 22nd as part of the celebration of the 300th anniversary of the Town of Needham. This event is a BAR Invitational, which means that everyone participating must be specifically invited. This is true for both Crown and Rebel Forces. Arrival and set up will be possible from Friday morning on, but everything must be done before the event site opens to the public at 10 am, Saturday morning, May 21st. Normal camp amenities will be provided to include water easily accessible close to each camp, ample firewood, straw for tents, and plenty of portable latrines, to include the larger ones beloved of the ladies. There will be a good number of high quality sutlers present. Parking will be about 300 yards away, through the woods, and entirely out of site...SO... the Needham Police WILL patrol the parking area, to include at night!

There will be a formal, ball Saturday night in Needham, with live, 18th century music, and a dance instructor/caller, with open bar, etc. This is discussed later in this invitation.

There will be three, battles. One Saturday afternoon and one Sunday afternoon will be staged for the public. The third, which will be a war game, will be held on Sunday morning and is optional. The site has been walked, looked at, discussed, and all planning done on the ground by the commanders, and other key officers from Crown and American forces. Essentially, Saturday will be 'Redcoats Rule', and Sunday will be 'Revenge of the Rebels'.

Brad Chetwynd, 2nd Massachusetts Regiment, is commanding the American forces, with Henry Cooke, 10th Massachusetts Light Infantry, as his second in command. Ken Siegel will command the Crown forces as a Brigadier General in America, with Paul O'Shaughnessy, 10th Regiment of Foot, as his second in command.

This event will be somewhat unique in that the public will not get to see the Crown Forces until they attack Saturday afternoon. To that end, the Crown camp will NOT be open to the public! It will actually be hidden. That doesn't mean it will be a modern, bring your Coleman lanterns, laptop thing at all, just that due to the scenario the Crown camp never figures in the 'show' and whereas the American camp will be a well set up, fortified, garrison encampment with all the 'bells an whistles' of a camp in place for a month, the Crown camp will be an authentic marching camp, set up so that the Crown Forces participants have a place to sleep, cook, eat, and relax when off duty.

Modern camping will be available in the parking area. A separate area will be set aside and a porta-john will be provided since this is several hundred yards from the main, encampment area. This area will be suitable for campers, trailers, and RV's.

*******JULY 16-17 WYOMING VALLEY MASSACRE – MT. COBB, PA (JOINT BB/CL EVENT)*******

This event was voted to be a national sanctioned event by both the Continental Line and the British Brigade. After several years of hosting successful events at Moon Lake State Park, the 24th Connecticut Militia Regiment moved the event in 2010 to private property, with equal success. Now, joined by the 42nd regiment of Foot, our British Brigade co-sponsors, we welcome you to join us for this fine 18th Century community event. On July 3, 1778, a Loyalist and Iroquois force numbering 800 or more under Col. John Butler ambushed an American militia force of some 300 or so under Colonel Zebulon Butler. This happened in nearby Wilkes-Barre, PA. Although they fought hard, he was forced to surrender, and battle was catastrophic for the militia. Fort Mifflin was forced to surrender, and the valley was laid waste.

Mt. Cobb is easy to get to, being just off of the intersections of 1-80, 1-84, & 1-380. See our directions on the website. Event staff will have access to the site Wednesday to lay out camps, and participants can arrive Thursday afternoon. Camps will be kept open until Monday at noon to accommodate those volunteers who travel a long distance.

The site is a series of privately owned farms, with hay meadows that will be mowed over before the event. The event has the full support of the local community, and last year over 700 visitors came. Many more are expected this year, with improved coverage of the event in the Scranton-Wilkes-Barre area. Wilkes-Barre, by the way, is named for the two champions of American rights in Parliament, John Wilkes and Isaac Barre.

This will be a campaign weekend, with excellent open woods for primitive camping. Canvas camps will be near the road. We have expanded the site from one battlefield to three this year, with two additional contiguous farms now made available to us. The battlefields are connected with trails, and the woods are open and easily passable, so the scenarios will integrate all the features of the site.

There will be scripted tactical for the afternoons, "woods walks" for the public in the mornings featuring ambushes and skirmishing, and unscripted small-unit actions through-out the days and evenings. Hasty fortifications built last year will be expanded on.

October 22-23 Ft. Mercer, Woodbury, NJ (Sunday only) Full and probationary members of the Continental Line and British Brigade are invited to participate in the annual commemoration of the 1777 assault on Fort Mercer on the grounds surrounding the original fort in National Park, New Jersey. Your unit should find this an especially interesting and action-filled event. Troops should be at Fort Mercer no later than 11 a.m. An officers meeting will take place in front of the Whitall House at 10:30 a.m. Two lively tacticals are scheduled for the afternoon. As in previous years, the sponsors will provide lunch to all troops and authentically-dressed campfollowers. The increased honorarium will be continued and your unit will receive a stipend of at least \$20 for each uniformed soldier present on the field and significant additional funds for artillery. Antique dealers, sutlers kept off the field by county employees and there is immediate battlefield cleanup by park staff. Fort Mercer is located in National Park, New Jersey, just South of Woodbury and only two miles directly off Exit 23 of I-295, via Hessian Avenue. One of the Delaware River defenses of Philadelphia, it was unsuccessfully attacked by Hessian forces on October 22, 1777. The site is a fine, open county park on the river bluffs nearly opposite Philadelphia's Ft. Mifflin.

All full and probationary members of the British Brigade and Continental Line are invited to participate in the annual commemoration of the "Whitemarsh Encampment" on the grounds of historic Hope Lodge, in Fort Washington, Pa. This great weekend of living history features three action-filled engagements that include assaults on an earthen redoubt, as well as nearly two dozen sutlers and the fabled Crown vs. Patriot tug-of-war! Hosted by the 43rd Regiment of Foot and First Continental Regiment, it is sponsored by the reenactor-friendly Friends of Hope Lodge. Musketmen, artilleryists, fifes, drums and distaff will all find this an event tailored for enjoyment with spacious ground for camping and a huge battle area.

Object of Event- To reintroduce the reenacting community to this site and to do something unique for re-enactors. Draw the public back to the Park with something visual and exciting to Venue- first part of weekend- event will start as tactical on Friday night and continuing thru night lasting for 24 hours till 5pm Saturday night. British shall have set camp and colonials are on campaign. Objective is to capture or destroy enemy. This event is closed to public. There are structures on site(houses, pavilions, barns and a grist mill) we would like to incorporate them in Second part of weekend- Sunday will be open to public with a scripted battle for public viewing. Those choosing not to take part in tactical and campaigning may arrive on Saturday afternoon and set up tents or arrive Sunday to participate in battle.

Access- Site is easily accessible from interstate 95 and parking shall be within walking distance of scenarios

Infrastructure- water, straw, and sanitation will be provided. Amenities and attractions- the towns of New Hope, Pa. and Lambertville N. J. are 7 miles upriver with many unique shops, restaurants and taverns. There are many bed and breakfasts in the area as well as hotels and motels. Trenton N.J. is just 15 miles. To the south on the Delaware River with lots of history including the historic Trenton Barracks (location of Hessian Forces during the Crossing period) Terrain- everything you can imagine, river and canal running thru whole area, wooded plots (dense and open) deep ravines, dirt roads, open pastures, homesteads, etc. - Saturday night tavern at one of the Parks pavilions. Jollification's provided by 5th Pa. Sutlers will be set up close to British Encampment.

July 21 2012- Prescott, Ontario

The British Brigade and Continental Line are invited to return to Prescott, Ontario—Home of Loyalist Days—to hold a major event in 2012. Although much of the area is commemorating the War of 1812, Prescott wants to celebrate its Revolutionary War Heritage. They will tie in with the region-wide 1812 programs and have scheduled this program to avoid any 1812 event conflicts. The last time the British Brigade and Continental Line were in Prescott, it was 1988, and a very enjoyable time was had by all. This event is jointly sponsored by the Town of Prescott, Parks Canada, the Kings Royal Regiment of New York, the 64th Regiment of Foot, and Continental Line Units TBD.

In 1787, Edward Jessup came to settle here on the 1,200-acre land granted to him by King George of England. Major Jessup had a portion of this grant surveyed as a town site in the year of 1810. He named the new settlement "Prescott" in honour of General Robert Prescott who had been governor-in-chief of all Canada between 1797-1807.

Prescott, Ontario is right across the St. Lawrence River from Ogdensburg, NY. It is 7 hours from Boston, 6 hours 35 minutes from New York City, 8 hours 45 minutes from Washington, DC, and 4 hours from Toronto. The town and fort site are going all-out to ensure that you and your family have a wonderful time. As with Fort George and Niagara-on-the-Lake, we recommend that you take vacation time and make this at least a long weekend, enjoying the local area.

Participants will be camped in open parkland around the fort, and within a few minute's walk of lovely downtown Prescott, with restaurants, B&Bs, groceries, and every other amenity you would expect. Interpretative programs will be run for the visiting public. Battles will be run each day. In the evening, an artillery bombardment of Fort de la Presentation in Ogdensburg, NY will take place using town-provided powder. Artillery will be placed on town-owned land under British Brigade and Continental Line firing rules. Arrangements for return fire are being made.

The surrounding area will be delightful for vacation time Besides Prescott itself . (<http://www.prescott.ca/>), you are near Montreal, Ottawa, the boating and fishing resort area of the Thousand Islands, Cornwall, Upper Canada Village, and other places of interest to our members. The battlefield (seen at right) is a natural amphitheatre with excellent public viewing. The terrain is natural and will make for interesting field battles. As in 1988, we will be camped around the Fort, leaving room for tactical actions against the fort. Event staff will have access to the site Wednesday to lay out camps, and participants can arrive Thursday afternoon. Camps will be kept open until Monday at noon to accommodate those volunteers who travel a long distance.

August – Oriskany 235th at Gelston Castle, Mohawk, NY

The British Brigade and Continental Line are invited to hold a national event at the Gelston Castle Estate to commemorate the 235th Anniversary of the Battle of Oriskany and Relief of Fort Stanwix, 1777. This premier event in the Mohawk Valley is in the town of Warren, just south of the villages of Herkimer, Mohawk, and German Flatts. This event is sponsored by the First New York Regiment, McCrackens Company of the Continental Line and the 24th and 64th Regiments of Foot of the British Brigade, in partnership with the non-profit Center for Green Leadership,

with funding from local companies. Herkimer was the site of Fort Dayton, from which Nicholas Herkimer and the 800 men of the Tryon County militia marched to relieve Fort Stanwix, but were ambushed at Oriskany instead. By mid-August, Arnold's relief column arrived and the siege was lifted. As a private site, BB & CL Safety regulations apply.

We promise a fine time (with cooperation from the gods of weather). There are three open battlefields, a ravine for the ambush, two ponds, and

lots of open woods. The open woods throughout the site will provide for campaign camps and woodland skirmishing. The main battlefield is quite large, 43 acres. The northern battlefield (for public demonstrations) and the eastern battlefield are only slightly smaller. All battlefields are connected for incorporation into elaborate scenarios, so battles will flow from one part of the estate to another, providing varied and interesting campaign opportunities. By comparison, at the September CL/BB event, the entire Brandywine Creek battlefield was on 17 acres.

Besides full-scale battles on Saturday and

Sunday afternoons, we will run this as a campaign event, with small unit scenarios scheduled throughout the day. At the same time, interpretative programs will be run for the visiting public.

The site management and administrative team at the Gelston Castle Estate are very excited about the event. Wood, straw, and potable water will be available in abundance. A new system has been installed to pipe water directly to the camps. They have an excellent infrastructure for camping. This event will commemorate the historic events of the Mohawk in 1777, including the resistance to the St. Leger campaign (Battle of Oriskany, Siege of Fort Stanwix, and Arnold's relief). The Valley was also the site of the Andrustown Massacre (1778) and the other valley raids of that year, the Clinton-Sullivan Expedition (1779), the Cherry Valley massacre (1779), Johnson's Raid of 1780 with the battles at Stone Arabia and Klock's Field, and the raids of 1781. Several key battles of the Mohawk Valley will be included, with the Battle of Oriskany being the keynote. With other demonstrations, this will provide two full days of interpretative, ceremonial, and educational programs for visitors. The Gelston Castle Estate Site is 330 acres of rolling terrain, mixed woods, fields, and a few acres of developed grounds, just a few miles south of the NY Thruway. The original community, Hendersontown, was founded in 1739 by a Surgeon in the British Army named Henderson, who purchased 20,000 acres of land in the hills here. The Gelston Castle Estate is only a few hundred yards from the Andrustown Massacre site (1778). Although the homes were burned in the raid by a troop of Loyalists and Iroquois under Joseph Brant, a barn on the property survives from circa 1750, and a wood frame house from 1787, when the area was resettled.
