Commander's Column

Huzzah My Fellow Fusiliers!

Campaign season is now in full swing and there are a number of exciting developments to update you on. Last month Paul Astle, Greg Urwin and I attended the Army Heritage Days event in Carlisle. We occupied a recreation of Redoubt #10 and spoke with a number of visitors, including the only British Officer in this year's Army War College class. He is a member of the Royal Tank Regiment and was very interested in our impression. We were even able to outfit his boys with some extra coats we had! One thing did occur to me though, even though there were only three of us, we all had a great time (not so much in getting acclimated to the heat) catching up and educating the public. The point is, is that events are what you make of them, whether it is three Fusiliers or 50. Staying in the South, Dr. John Maass, one of our Fusiliers in the DC Metro area (and a Historian at the Center of Military History), just released a publication *The Road to Yorktown*. John sent me a short description of his work and generously offered to autograph copies. My check will be in the mail shortly. Congrats John on all of your hard work and getting your book published. I look forward to reading it (except the chapter on the tragedy at Yorktown). More information on the book and how to purchase a copy is listed in Section IV.

Moving from academic publications to the World Wide Web, Mike Miller continues to press ahead on our new website, which I would estimate is about 80-90% complete. Colour Event: Fort Ticonderoga, 12-13 Sept 15

This will be our main effort this year. A large brigade event combined with a scenic area and the largest 18th Century fortress in North America should make this one of the better events this season. The scenario is based on the raid of Colonel John Brown and the Massachusetts militia against the Crown Forces garrison in September of 1777. The change of command ceremony will also be conducted this weekend.

2016 Events:

- 24-28 February (ALL) St Kitts--Here is information (from Ken Siegel) on the event:
- "Gentlemen of the Recreated 23rd Regiment of Foot, the Royal Welch Fusiliers in America:,
- Wednesday, 24 February Sunday 28 February 2016 are the dates for Brimstone Hill Fort, St Kitts. The event is the same as in the past, but there will be many more West Indian Regiment soldiers this time, properly uniformed and armed.

The following invitation is for fully uniformed in late war kit, musket firing, ENLISTED

soldiers of any company. Officers may come but must appear and field as enlisted men. There will be only two British Officers, one of whom will command the French when the battles take place. NCOs will assume leadership roles as are necessary based on actual turn out at the event. The Drum Major will attend and up to two (2) more musicians may come BUT, they must be fully uniformed, with appropriate instrument AND be completely competent and pre-approved by the Drum Major. All rules and regulations of the 23rd apply. Safety regulations are those of the British Brigade.

All members of the 23rd who participated last time, in early March 2014, and members of the 23rd who are coming for the first time are invited on an almost all expense paid basis. That means \$700 toward air fare to and from your home airport and St Kitts, on island transportation, supper on 24 February, all meals on 25 and 26 February, and breakfast on 28 February (you're on your own for food on Saturday 27 February which is a day off for you to enjoy the island). You get a cot inside a barracks room in the fort with modern plumbing to include showers next to the barracks rooms. By the way, the view when you walk outside the barracks rooms is spectacular. Ask those who have been there before! Black powder will be provided for cartridge making.

Up to but not more than forty (40) members may come.

Regimental women properly costumed, who are wives of significant others, or GROWN children of members participating (meaning at least teen aged adolescents) may come at their own expense regarding air fare, but will receive food and lodging and transportation, and only will have to 'perform' on one of the two event days, Thursday or Friday. NO CHILDREN!!! There are separate bathrooms for ladies but no separate barracks. Women will bunk with their soldier/sponsor.

MEMBERS WHO WISH TO TRAVEL ON THEIR OWN TIME AND ARRIVE AND LEAVE EARLIER OR LATER MAY DO SO BUT THEY ARE THEN RESPONSIBLE FOR THEIR OWN GROUND TRANSPORTATION TO AND FROM THE FORT.

The way the travel to and from the island works is simple. Each member is responsible for making his own airline reservation, with arrival on Wednesday 24 February and departure on Sunday 28 February... or sooner and later if you want but then you're on your own for lodging and meals until the event dates begin. You send a copy of your paid, reservation to me (Ken Siegel, 27 Grant Street, Needham, Massachusetts 02492) and I will immediately send you a check for Seven hundred dollars (\$700.00). Check with those who went last time if you don't believe this is for real! If you can do it for less than \$700 good for you, you still get \$700... some may have to spend more... but \$600 is what you'll get. Right now the American Airlines round trip fare on the event dates from New York City is \$771.00.

The 23rd has until October 1st to do this. After that the event will be opened to other units and since those who went last time will be offered the same deal, the numbers will fill up quickly. It's first reserve, first get a place. And please, make sure you can really go before buying your ticket. If you have to cancel I'll want the money back! (because this is entirely from me just by the way) ...so make sure you're coming!

Get a rigid ski case for your musket. You can get at least two inside each plus bayonets and other stuff. there is NO!!!! problem bringing muskets in and out of the US or to St Kitts. We're the invited guest of the St Kitts government, Fort, and military.

Now then...what will you be doing?... that's easy. You'll be garrisoning the fort along with the West Indian Regiment (all of whom are real soldiers in the St Kitts and Nevis Defense Force who Don Beale and I have been training and drilling for literally years, and will again this fall.) you will fight two battles on Thursday and two on Friday. Some of you will remove your 'red' and play French each time... we'll alternate this. I command the french. We froggies lose... badly... oh well :-). Figure on a formal review each day, formal guard mounts, and other related stuff...but also plenty of time off to just enjoy the place.

Don Beale is in over all command. I'm 2IC and always the French commander for the battles. No other officers!

That's it...and it's fun...again, ask those who have been there.

A. Reading Suggestion: Here is the info John Maass sent on his new publication:

"In July, The History Press of Charleston, S.C. will publish my new book, "The Road to Yorktown: Jefferson, Lafayette and the Invasion of Virginia."

This book explores the 1781 British invasion of central Virginia in the campaign leading up to the Siege of Yorktown in October 1781. In this campaign, Virginia Governor Thomas Jefferson and Major General the Marquis de Lafayette desperately tried to counter the active operations of the invading redcoats led by Lieutenant General Charles, Lord Cornwallis, whose march across the Piedmont and Tidewater regions devastated much of the Old Dominion. This dramatic story also includes many key figures of the Revolutionary War, including Patrick Henry, Nathanael Greene, "Mad" Anthony Wayne, Jack Jouett, Baron von Steuben, and even Daniel Boone. The 23rd Regiment also figured prominently in this campaign!

As most of you know, I am a military historian with the U.S. Army in Washington, DC, and have published numerous books and articles on 18th century military history and the American Revolution. I've also been in the 23rd since 1995.
