## -- Event Reports

Paul Astle, Steve Raby, and I attended the annual Celtic Fest in Bethlehem on the weekend of September 28th and 29th. We set up a recruiting booth on both days. Many people commented, many times hesitatingly, on our bravery wearing our uniforms to the event. After informing them that the 23th was a Welsh regiment in the British Army, which also included English, Irish, and Scottish Regiments. We received a lot of compliments and took many photos with visitors. It was a great opportunity to speak with and educate people on the Regiment and the British Army during the American War of Independence.

RWFIA members attended the Germantown event in Philadelphia. Paul Astle, John Crawford, and I represented the Regiment during both battles. Lieut. Gen. Riley, accompanied by David Leslie-Hughes, reviewed the troops and presented a replica set of the 23rd's Colours to the Cliveden Association that administers the site. It was a great opportunity to speak with and dine with our Colonel.

On October 12<sup>th</sup> and 13<sup>th</sup>, the 23<sup>rd</sup> participated in the British Brigade's main event at Mount Harmon, Maryland. The event marked one of our larger turnouts. Participants included: Joe Siegel, Justin and Kyle Parker, Eric Spaar, Alex Ivanchishin, John Crawford, Mike and Alex Miller, Shane Watson, and I. Eric set up and ran the mess kitchen to feed the troops.

The British Brigade created a full schedule of events and activities for the weekend. The 23<sup>rd</sup> was assigned to the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion under Maj. Paul Loane's command. Other 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion units included the 43<sup>rd</sup>, 1<sup>st</sup> New Jersey Volunteers, Regiment von Hyun, and elements from the Guards. Our first assignment was to raid a rebel outpost with the 43<sup>rd</sup>. The 43<sup>rd</sup>, which was the preponderance of the Crown Force element, provided the main effort by attacking the rebel right. The 23<sup>rd</sup>, moving in on the rebel left, executed a shaping action to draw the attention of the rebel force. The rebels were in the process of changing the guard when we attacked and had double the number of enemy troops we planned for. The rebels counterattacked, outnumbering the RWFIA be almost 3 to 1. We exchanged volley and conducted a retrograde operation towards the camp. The rebel force split and attacked from both sides. Fusiliers fought until nearly the last round and fixed bayonets, but I offered my sword to spare our outnumbered force.

Saturday afternoon's scenario involved defense of a redoubt. The 23<sup>rd</sup>, placed near the left flank, assembled in the front of the redoubt and exchanged volleys with the attacking rebel force. With ammunition stocks depleting, Crown Forces moved inside of the redoubt and continued the fight from the defensive works. After devastating the rebel elements in front of our position, the Adjutant guided up outside of the redoubt to press the remaining rebel troops. As we marched towards the remaining enemy troops our contingent was attacked by a dozen, rebel horse. We did our best to fight them off and the scenario concluded shortly afterwards.

Sunday began a bit slower. We did not participate in the morning picket exercise since we burned so much powder during Saturday's events. Privates Kyle Parker and Mike Laurino tested their sea legs and participated in an amphibious operation as part of the morning battle. The afternoon battle involved the capture of the rebel redoubt and included several sharp volleys from the 23<sup>rd</sup> as the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion pressed their attack. The Fusiliers sustained heavy casualties from cannon fire as the attack advanced closer. The brigade was forced back and eventually, like Saturday's action, enemy cavalry overran the 23<sup>rd</sup> near the battle's conclusion.

Overall, it was a great event with beautiful weather at a beautiful site. The British Brigade did a great job of creating a variety of scenarios and activities during the weekend. Special thanks to Eric Spaar for feeding the troops; he did a great job of preparing and operating the field mess. We had participants from the Grenadier, Light Infantry, Colonel's, and Capt. Horsefall's Companies and most importantly everyone had a good time! I hope that we can keep this trend going next season by getting more troops into the field.
