The big event for the year is going to be the Fort Louden at the end of May. This was supposed to be a British only school of the soldier event with the big event being at Boone's homestead but as the state shut down Boone's late last year that was dropped and with colonial troops asking to be let in it has changed into a general event.

The other thing to note is the last weened of September has two events. The one in Fishkill has been set up by Dennis Murphy with local colonial units. It's about an hour's drive north of Westchester in an area with lots of interest in the period but not many active groups. This is a real chance to expand into the region hungry for history. I was up there last year at the gun show and it is a lovely stretch of the Hudson River valley

At the same time the Celtic show is maybe an hour north of Philadelphia and will be a day of talking to the public, recruiting and educating.
